"TRICK OR THREAT"

A Virus warning or a "Hoax"?

Email is sent to me all the time with warnings of new viruses. It helps to remind me why I am careful about keeping all our machines updated with the latest virus definitions. But from time to time I will get an email from someone that "thinks" their machine is infected. Well meaning, but without checking first, they forward the warning to everyone in their address book, not realizing that the email is a "**Hoax**." Or that what the warning tells you to remove from your machine **IS** the threat itself. The "Hoax" strongly encourages you with step by step instructions to delete a legitimate Windows file from your computer.

Others like the "**SULFNBK.EXE**." had people removing critical system files. This one is not as bad as that. It removes a java script that is not a critical system file. Although **Symantec** says on their site, that some versions of this hoax take advantage of an actual threat like the "bugbear" and others.

This is part of the message I received, but there are many versions out there.

["Sorry but the Teddy Bear virus was passed to me and my address book was infected. Since you are in my address book, you will probably find it in your computer too. The virus (called jdbg.exe) is not detected by Norton or McAfee Anti-virus systems. The virus sits quietly for 14 days before damaging the system. It is sent automatically my "messenger" and by address book, whether or not you sent e-mail to your contacts.

Here is how to check for the virus and how to get rid of it. Please do this!!"]

A Hoax causes unnecessary worry, and problems. That is why I check with **Symantec**, **McAfee**, and others before I will do anything. I know you are all anti-virus conscious computer users. Just remember to check out that "well meaning" warning, before you follow the instructions to delete and forward the message. Here are some links with info on virus protection and checking out a Hoax.

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External Hard Drive Enclosure

I was asked to write an article for the newsletter. This one concerns an external hard drive enclosure (**HDE** from here on). You might have read my article on the **ICON Yahoo Newsgroup**, if so this is a recap.

You might need an External Hard Drive Enclosure if:

- 1- You're moving more data than you can fit on a floppy disc or in a thumb drive
- 2- And or you don't have or want to use a laptop computer,
- 3- Or if you do not have a free bay in your computer case.
- 4- Or if you have some big files that you need to work on at work and at home

The HDE is a solution for you. I prefer the "assemble it yourself" type. It is VERY easy to assemble one of these units. You select the hard drive (or CDR or DVD-R drive) that you wish to use, insert it into the enclosure case, connect it with two polarized plugs (so you can't hook it up incorrectly), fasten a few screws (six on mine), plug it in and you are ready to go.

If you decide to use a "pre-built external hard drive," you will more than likely void the warranty if you open the case and try to substitute another drive. In the future when the drive dies (all drives die, it's just a matter of when, I'm sorry to say) You might not be able to open the case on the pre-built units and pop in a new drive. I have found that as hard drive prices keep dropping you can find a great reason to swap in a new bigger hard drive to your computer and not throw out a still working old hard drive that you may have outgrown. You could buy an **iPod** and get the added benefit of getting a portable MP3 player, but I find that as good and sexy as they are I find them a little too pricy for my tastes.

I did a **Google** search and discovered many HDE's. Some were made of plastic, some made of metal; some had more than one interface (more on that in a minute) some even had fans and one I believe had some neon lights. All of the units I saw used "wall-warts" those black transformers that are all too common under my desk. The only other decision that you will have to make is what interface you would like on the back of the HDE. This is usually either USB or Firewire. I was fortunate that I discovered one that had both so it should work for me almost anywhere (URL below). I would recommend using the ones that are designed for conventional hard drives and have what is called a 5 ¼" Form Factor. Don't panic, this simply means that the enclosure is approximately the size of a drive bay in a computer. You will find that virtually any hard drive that you are likely to buy will fit in easily. I hope that I have convinced you to take a look for HDE's and see how they can help you.

GOOGLE SEARCH, learn what you can do [Part 1 - Basic Search]

During a recent large thunderstorm, I turned off a computer and picked up a book to read. It was titled,

“Google Hacks: 100 Industrial-Strength Tips & Tools” by Tara Calishain and Rael Dornfest. A book from the library, which caught my eye, about how to use the **GOOGLE SEARCH ENGINE** more efficiently. If you like what you read in the next couple of Newsletters, you too may wish to pick up the book at your local library. If they don't have it - they can reserve it from another Suffolk County library.

There are several search engines to help you find the information that you need. Other search engines (like **Yahoo**) have searchable subject indexes (titles and descriptions only). There are other search engines (such as **Google**) which are full-text search engines (title, description, content and more).

How do you search? At the Google Search Webpage(<http://www.google.com/search>) enter the following:

(1) WORDS IN QUOTES - look for an exact match (in that order) to the quoted phrase [“three blind mice”].

(2) WORDS NOT IN QUOTES - looks all combinations of these words. Matches first WORD AND second WORD AND third WORD for results. ‘AND’ is the default, when no word is supplied. [three blind mice]

(3) WORDS WITH THE OR TERM - looks for any of these words. Matches first WORD OR second WORD or third WORD. ‘OR’ can be substituted with a vertical bar (|). [three OR blind] or [three | blind]

(4) COMBINATION OF CONDITIONS - looks for a combination of the words. Such as a match the first WORD (that must exist) AND with one of two WORDS (either or both must exist). Parentheses are used to control the combination of [three AND (blind OR mice)] Could MATCH any of these three conditions: (three, blind), (three, mice) (three, blind, mice).

(5) WORD EXCEPTIONS - looks for a match of other words (but this word must not exist). A minus sign (-) is used to indicate the exception. [three mice -blind] MEANING: (three mice not blind).

A quick search, called “FEELING LUCKY,” returns the first place that **Google** thinks that you're looking for. If you do not find what you need, you'll need to search some more.

GOOGLE is not case sensitive (like other search engines), so you can type in lower, upper or a combination of upper and lower case and still get the same results.

GOOGLE can only search up to 10 WORDS (that's the limit). Any more words than 10, the additional words are ignored. GOOGLE does not use partial wildcards (no mo*, *mo, or *mo*). But, they do use full word wildcard - an asterisk (*) to represent a complete word. [three * mice].

Remember to hold onto these newsletters - each month, we will add more to what you have already read.

*** **Newsletter Editors' note:** This is a great book! I keep it right next to my PC.

It definitely saves valuable time and frustration when you need to do a search. The book also explains how GOOGLE can be used for so much more than just an average search.
